

A New List of the High-Priests of Ptah at Memphis till the End of the Ancient Egyptian History (332 BCE)

(Part 1: Till the End of the New Kingdom)

قائمة جديدة بكتاب كهنة بتاح منف حتى نهاية التاريخ المصري القديم (٣٣٢ ق. م.)
الجزء الأول: حتى نهاية عصر الدولة الحديثة

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ملخص

تميز كبار كهنة بفتح مدنية منف العظيمة لقباً مهنياً (حرفيًا)، يُقرأ حالياً "ور خرب حمووت" wr *hrp hmw*. أو: "ور خربو حمووت" wr *hrp.w hmw.wt* ويُترجم: 'عظيم / كبير رؤساء الحرفيين'. ومن الملفت للنظر أن المصادر الأثرية قد سجلت استخدام المصريين للقب كاسم لبعض الذكور إبان الأسرتين الثامنة عشرة والتاسعة عشرة.

حملَ كبار كهنة منف العظيمة لقباً مهنياً (حرفيًا)، يُقرأ حالياً "ور خرب حمووت" wr *hrp hmw*.

إن هذه المقالة تعرض لأحدث قائمة لكتاب كهنة بتاح منف قد توصل إليها الباحث، لكن هذه الدراسة قاصرة على الفترة الممتدة منذ أول ظهور للقب الدال على ذلك المنصب مع نهاية الأسرة الثانية وحتى آخر كبير كهنة في الأسرة الثلاثين تمدنا به المصادر قبل غزو الإسكندر الأكبر لمصر عام ٣٣٢ ق.م. والجزء الأول من هذه المقالة يعطي حتى نهاية عصر الدولة الحديثة وسوف تكمل في العدد القادم من الدورية.

وتعد الدراسة الحالية تحديثاً شاملًا لدراسات كل من:

- دير فيلدونج Dieter Wildung (عام ١٩٧٧ م) في مقالته بالجزء الثاني من موسوعة علم المصريات (LÄ II ١٢٥٦-١٢٦٥)، والتي أورد فيها (٨٣) ثلاثة وثمانين كبير كهنة في الفترة الممتدة من الأسرة الثانية/ الثالثة وحتى الأسرة السابعة والعشرين، هذا بالإضافة إلى (١٣) ثلاثة عشر كبير كهنة في العصر اليوناني-الروماني.
 - تشارلز مايستر Charles Maystre برسالته للدكتوراه المعروفة كبار كهنة بتاح منف، (عام ١٩٤٨ م) ونشرت في العدد ١١٣ من سلسلة OBO (عام ١٩٩٢ م). وقد تضمنت فقط (٥٢) اثنين وخمسين كبير كهنة حتى الأسرة السابعة والعشرين، بالإضافة إلى (١٠) عشرة كبار كهنة في العصر البطلمي وكبير كهنة واحد في العصر الروماني.
 - قائمة بورتر-موس Porter-Moss (عام ١٩٨١ م) في PM III، ط ٢، ٩١٦-٩١٨، والتي أشارت إلى (٤٦) ستة وأربعين كبير كهنة فقط حتى الأسرة السابعة والعشرين كان من بينهم (٣) ثلاثة كبار كهنة مجهولين، هذا بالإضافة إلى (٧) سبعة كبار كهنة فقط في العصر البطلمي.

تأتي أهمية الدراسة الحالية من كونها، اعتماداً على كل من الآثار المعاصرة وقوائم الأنساب، قد حضرت (١٠٤) مائة وأربعة كبار كهنة لمنف من عصر الأسرة الثانية وحتى عصر الأسرة الثلاثين بنهاية التاريخ المصري القديم (٣٣٢ ق.م.)؛ حيث وضعهم الباحث في ترتيب زمني جديد أكثر منطقية وملاءمة -ما سبق- لواقع الحفائر والدراسات الحديثة، خاصةً

أن هناك العديد من كبار الكهنة يحملون نفس الاسم في ذات العهد أو العصر (أمثال: پتاح-شپس، سابو، پتاح-مس، سن-نفر، حري، خعي-م-واست)، من وجب دمج بعضهم أو تفريق (فصل وتعديل) البعض الآخر، وكذلك إعادة تاريخ عهودهم وترتيبهم من جديد، وذلك اعتماداً على طريقة كتابة اللقب وترتيبه بين الألقاب الأخرى في السير الذاتية. كما أضاف الباحث، في هذه القائمة الجديدة، أسماء كبار كهنة جدد لم يرد ذكرهم سابقاً (مثل: حاتيابي)، بعضهم يمد معارفنا عن كبار كهنة منف من عصر الأسرة السابعة والعشرين – التي توقفت عندها جميع قوائم الكهنة الذين سبق ذكرهم أعلىـ إلى عصر الأسرة الثلاثين.

Memphis¹ was one of the greatest capitals of Ancient Egypt, if it was not the greatest one, and in the Greco-Roman Egypt² as a national capital against the foreign one, *i.e.* Alexandria (Αλεξανδρία ἡ προς τη Αιγύπτῳ = ‘Alexandria, the capital which is outside/near to Egypt’; or as the Latin called it ‘*Alexandread ad Aegyptum*’ = ‘Alexandria beside Egypt’³).

In this ancient city, the High Priests of Ptah at Memphis (HPPM) held a professional title that is recently⁴ read *wr hrp.w hmw.wt* and translated as ‘Greatest of the Directors of craftsmen’ or *wr hrp hmw.wt* as ‘great director of craftsmen’.⁵ They played a very important role in both their city and all Ancient Egypt in religious, political, cultural, social, and economical activities.⁶ They were recognized by their necklace  called  or  *s'ḥ* (Fig. A 1-2)⁷ and by wearing ‘Gepard’-skin (Latin: Acinonux Jubatus).⁸ The title of the High priest of Memphis had been re-used by the ancient Egyptians, as a name  *Uer-kherpu-hemut*, or *Wer-kherpu-hemut*) for the males during the New Kingdom (1549-1069 BCE), exclusively during the Eighteenth and Nineteenth Dynasties.⁹

This article is updating the list of High Priests of Ptah at Memphis, which was made by Dieter Wildung in 1977¹⁰ (who mentioned 83 HPPM from the Second/Third Dynasties till the Twenty-seventh Dynasty, plus 13 HPPM in Greco-Roman Egypt). It also updates other lists published by Charles Maystre¹¹ (PhD 1948, published in OBO 113) in 1992 (who mentioned 52) HPPM till the Twenty-seventh Dynasty, and 10

HPPM in the Ptolemaic Period, plus 1 HPPM in the Roman Empire Period), and Porter-Moss in 1981¹² (mentioned 46 HPPM including 3 unknown, and only 7 HPPM who carried the title in the Ptolemaic Period).

In this article, the researcher has collected, from both the contemporary resources¹³ and the genealogy lists (Figs. B, C, and D)¹⁴ of the HPPM, around 104 Memphite High-Priests until the end of ancient Egyptian history (332 BCE), ordering and putting them in a new sequence dating list¹⁵ which is more reasonable than the old lists, especially that many persons carry the same name¹⁶ in the same reign or period. The present part of article stops at the End of the New Kingdom and it will be continued in the next issue (no. 4).












I. Old Kingdom and First Intermediate Period



1-  *Nfr-dd-Pth*,¹⁷ Temp. Nineteer (Second Dynasty) to Third Dynasty, fragment* from Djoser Complex carrying the title *wr hrp.w hmw.wt*.¹⁸





2-  *Ij-m-htp*, (?) He was not mentioned by any list of HPPM, but the ancient Egyptian tradition considered him as HPPM (mythological) in the Late Greco-Roman Periods. Temp. *Ntr-irj-h* ‘Djoser’ (Third Dynasty).¹⁹

- 3-  *Hr-b3.w-Skr*,²⁰ (?), Temp. Third Dynasty,²¹ was not mentioned by D. Wildung, possible by Ch. Maystre,²² definitely by Elizabeth Staehelin* and Michael Rice.²³
- 4-  *Nbw*,²⁴ LG 72*,²⁵ Temp. Fourth and Fifth Dynasties, sure by Wildung,²⁶ doubt by Maystre²⁷ who considered that Nbw carried the title as a professional-office not as a priestly-office.²⁸
- 5-  *Pth-spss I*,²⁹ MM C1 (Saqqara)³⁰: statue CG. 93*; statue CG. 368; BM. Stele 682; Urk. I, 51-53.³¹ His Wife: princess  *H3j-M3t*, Temp. from *Mn-k3.w-R*^c (4th Dynasty) till the reign of *Nj-Wsr-R*^c (5th Dynasty).³²
- 6-  *S3bw I*,³³ MM C16 (Saqqara),³⁴ mentioned on the monuments of Sahurac Funeral Complex,³⁵ Temp. of *S3hw-R*^c (5th Dynasty).³⁶
- 7-  *Rc-nfr*,³⁷ MM C5 (Saqqara)³⁸: statue CG. 18*1 (JE. 10064, SR. 10064), statue CG. 19*2 (JE. 10063, SR. 10063); Temp. early 5th Dynasty.³⁹ Wife: 'she who is known by the king' *Hknw* (statue CG. 53).⁴⁰
- 8-  *Nfr.f-Rc-cnh(w)* (Ch. Maystre's Reading⁴¹), *cnh-Nfr.f-R*^c (H. Ranke's and D. Wildung's Reading⁴²), or *Rc-nfr.f-cnh* (PM III2's Reading⁴³); MM D58 (?)⁴⁴ mentioned only, till now, on the false door which was a gift from the HPPM to the inspector of the *hmw-k3* priests  (CG. 1410*, SR. 1/5318, 73 x 34 cm) from MM G0 (Saqqara) and maybe also on the statue CG. 87 (?) (SR. 1/5210) from MM D58.⁴⁵ Temp. middle of 5th Dynasty according to Wildung and the reign of the King *Rc-nfr.f* or his successors on 5th Dynasty according to PM III2.⁴⁶
- 9-  *S3bw II*, he whose beautiful name is  *Jbbj*, MM E1 (Saqqara),⁴⁷ false door
- CG. 1565*1, SR. 1/4686 a,⁴⁸ two walls of the tomb CG. 1418, SR. 1/4686 b. and CG. 1419, SR. 1/4686 c.; was born after the middle of *Nj-Wsr-R*^c reign and D. Wildung supposed that he maybe a son of *Pth-spss I*. (?), became a priest in the reign of *Mn-k3.w-Hr* (5th Dynasty) and HPPM in both reign of *Wnj* (late 5th Dynasty) and *Ttj* (early 6th Dynasty) and possibly lived even later than that (?) He had a lot of children; one of them was his successor *Pth-spss II*. He would like to be combined with his private monkey (2nd lower register of CG. 1419*2).⁴⁹ In his tomb at Saqqara and in another at Giza one of his officers carried the title *s3 md3.t s3b(t.) n wd(t.)-mdw n(t.) wr-hrp(w)-hm.t.*⁵⁰
- 10-  *Pth-spss II*,⁵¹ MM E2 (Saqqara) connected to his father's tomb MM E1 (*S3bw II. - Jbbj*).⁵² Temp. *Ttj* to *Ppj I*. (6th Dynasty),⁵³ maybe he was born at the end of 5th Dynasty under the reign of *Dd-k3-R*^c - *Jssj*.⁵⁴
- 11-  *Pth-spss III*,⁵⁵ MM C9 (Saqqara).⁵⁶ Temp. 6th Dynasty.⁵⁷
- 12-  *Pth-spss IV*,⁵⁸ a small unnumbered tomb that was not noticed by Mariette located south of MM E1-2 and MM H3 and to the north of Djoser Complex at Saqqara. Temp. 6th Dynasty.⁵⁹
- 13-  *S3bw III km*; he was described as km 'the black one',⁶⁰ MM C23 (Saqqara),⁶¹ statue CG. 143* (SR. 15706), Temp. 6th Dynasty.⁶²
- 14-  *S3bw VI*,⁶³ MM B6 ? (Saqqara)⁶⁴: statue CG. 190*1⁶⁵ (SR. 15178, now in Kom-Ushim 'Karanis' Museum, Al-Fayyum), stand CG. 1300*2 (SR. 15619), Naples Museum 1017. Temp. 6th Dynasty.⁶⁶
- 15-  *S3bw IV*, he whose beautiful name is  *Ttj*,⁶⁷ MM E3 (Saqqara)⁶⁸: false door (?) CG. 1756* (SR. 14943) and CG. 1709. Temp.

Ppj II and his successors (end of 6th Dynasty),⁶⁹ rather than Pepy I, since the name appears in the Mortuary Temple of Pepy II.⁷⁰

- 16-  *Ny-m3c.t-Rc*, (?), MM D17 (Saqqara),⁷¹ Cairo Museum Statue CG. 51, Middle of 5th or later [PM],⁷² 6th Dynasty [Maystre], had been considered before as HPPM by E. Schiaparelli,⁷³ and doubted by Ch. Maystre⁷⁴ who mentioned him although he did not carry the title of HPPM but other titles such as cm-priest and Director of the kilt, etc.⁷⁵
- 17-  *Iny-enh*, (?), son of the 'Overseer of the House of Weaving Women of the Residence'  *Mjnw-nfr*. Mastaba D26 (Saqqara),⁷⁶ who had carried the titles*: *hry-c3*, *wr pr-c3*, *imy-r hmw.t nb.t* on the right column, and the title *wr hrp hmw.t nb.t* 'Overseer of all craftsmen', etc. [PM] in the left column as M. Murray guessed,⁷⁷ and Ch. Maystre⁷⁸ had doubted that he was one of the HPPM.⁷⁹
- 18-  *nh(.w)*,⁸⁰ the owner of the Louvre limestone Statue E. 17365* (7 cm.),⁸¹ Temp. First Intermediate Period.⁸²
- 19-  *Pth-sps5* V, he whose beautiful name is  *Impy*,⁸³ son of HPPM *nh(.w)* (?), Louvre seated Statue A 108 [N.113], Temp. First Intermediate Period,⁸⁴ although PM III2 sited that he lived in early Fifth Dynasty.⁸⁵
- II. Middle Kingdom and Second Intermediate Period**
- 20-  *Pth-m-hb*,⁸⁶ mentioned only until now on the genealogical tree of HPPM on Berlin 23673: 4/13. Reign of *Mntw-htp* II. *Nb-hrw-Rc* (11th Dynasty).⁸⁷
- 21-  *Sbk-htp-hkw* (*wr hrp hmw.t*), on two of the 12th Dynasty statues (M-1749* and M-2788), found in Memphis' excavations (1915-1923) by the University Museum of the University of Pennsylvania (Philadelphia,

U.S.A.).⁸⁸ We could identify him with the HPPM  *Sbk-htp-hnw*, son of the wab-priest of the goddess Neith  *Rsnb* and of the lady  *N.t-nwb*, from the same period, who had a seated headless granite statue (Philadelphia, University Museum, E. 13647*) mentioned by Porter and Moss.⁸⁹ End of 11th/beginning of 12th Dynasties.⁹⁰

- 22-  *Dfj-j-hcpj I*,⁹¹ (?), son of *Jd-c3t* and his wife called *Sn.wj*. He was the ruler of Assiut (Rock Tomb no. 1 in the western mountain which is called 'Iṣṭabl 'Antar'),⁹² buried in Kerma (Sudan). He carried titles: *mdw-Hp* 'the responsible/guardian of Apis' and *wr hrp hmw.t m (nb.wj) pr.wj* 'the great chief of craftsmen in (both) houses' in inscriptions nos. 332-333, on the south side of the eastern door in his Tomb (no. 1) at Assiut.⁹³ Reign of *Sn-wśrt I. Hpr-k3-Rc* (12th Dynasty).⁹⁴
- 23-  or  *Shtp-jb-Rc-nh*⁹⁵ son of Vizier *Mntw-htp* (who was called in Berlin 23673: 4/5 Vizier *Ntr.wj-htp*) and lady *Htjj* (Saqqara Stele*1 discovered on 6 January 1924, in Saqqara magazine⁹⁶). Reign of *Sn-wśrt I.* (12th Dynasty). He was mentioned on several monuments such as: [1] The Base of the black granite statue purchased from Saqqara in 1890 by Wilbour, now in Brooklyn Museum 16.580.87*2;⁹⁷ [2] A limestone Offering table from Maasara quarries, now in Brooklyn Museum 37.1498 E*3;⁹⁸ [3] An offering table [from Tod], now in Berlin Museum 1189*4.⁹⁹
- 24-  *S-n-wśrt-cnh.w*,¹⁰⁰ son of *Shtp-jb-Rc-nh* I. [no. 22], large mastaba at el-Lisht, Reign of *Sn-wśrt I* (12th Dynasty).¹⁰¹
- 24.a-  *Hcj-k3.w-Rc-nh* (Berlin 23673: 4/4)¹⁰² corrected to  *Hpr-k3-Rc-nh* by H.G. Fischer,¹⁰³ and he may also be according

to him the same HPPM called *S-n-wśr.t-‘nh*.
w [no. 23] son of *Šhtp-jb-Rc-‘nh* I. [no. 22].
 Reigns of *Sn-wśrt* I. *Hpr-k3-Rc* to *Imn-m-h3.t*
 II. *Nbw-k3.w-Rc* (12th Dynasty).

25- *Nbw-k3.w-Rc-nht* called also
 or *Š3-rnp.wt* II. ‘the
 overseer of Khnum priests at Elephantine’
 (his tomb no. 31 in Qubbet el-Hawwa, west
 Aswan¹⁰⁴), nephew of *Š3-rnp.wt* I. son *Š3.t-tnj* (Qubbet el-Hawwa, Tomb no. 36). In
 my opinion, he could be equal to *Nbw-k3.w-Rc-‘nh* [no. 24.a]. Reign of *Sn-wśrt* II. *Hc-j-hpr-Rc* and his successors (12th
 Dynasty).

25.a- *Nbw-k3.w-Rc-‘nh*, mentioned on
 Berlin 23673: 4/3, son of [HPPM no. 23.a]
Hc-j/Hpr-k3.w-Rc-‘nh. Reign of *Sn-wśrt* II.
Hc-j-hpr-Rc to *Sn-wśrt* III. *Hc-j-k3-Rc* (12th
 Dynasty).

26- [...] *h.t*, mentioned on Berlin
 23673: 4/1, son of ‘god father, priest of Sobek
Šhtp-jb-snb’ (Berlin 23673: 4/2) and grandson
 of [HPPM no. 24.a] *Nbw-k3.w-Rc-‘nh* (Berlin 23673: 4/3). Reign of *Sn-wśrt* III.
Hc-j-k3-Rc (12th Dynasty).

27- *Šhtp-jb-Rc-‘nh* II., who he was
 described as *ndm* on Group-statue Louvre A.
 47. Reign of *Imn-m-h3.t* III. *Nj-m3c.t-Rc* (12th
 Dynasty).

28- *Nb(j)-pw* (Group-statue Louvre
 A. 47)¹⁰⁵ or *Nb(j)-pw-n(j)-Rc*
 (Saqqara List CG. 34516 A*, JE. 11335, SR.
 11967), son of [HPPM no. 26] *Šhtp-jb-Rc-‘nh*
 II.-*ndm*. Reign of *Imn-m-h3.t* III. *Nj-m3c.t-Rc*
 (12th Dynasty).

29- *Šhtp-jb-Rc-‘nh* III., who was
 described as *ndm-šrj / hrđ* on Group-statue
 Louvre A. 47¹⁰⁶ and maybe mentioned also

on Berlin 1189 (?!). Reign of *Imn-m-h3.t* III.
Nj-m3c.t-Rc (12th Dynasty) and his successors
 until the beginning of 13th Dynasty (2nd
 Intermediate Period).

30- *Šnb.wj*, his wife called *Nbw-m-hb* and their son *Rc-Stš*,
 who are mentioned on the Stele of Fitzwilliam
 Museum E. SS. 37*.¹⁰⁷ Temp. End of the
 Middle Kingdom or the beginning of 13th
 Dynasty (2nd Intermediate Period).

31- *Šr-gm* (?), mentioned on Berlin 23673:
 3/13, Temp. of *Jbj*- *Mr-nfr-Rc* (Pap. Turin Cat. 1874 vs.) = *Šnfr-k3-Rc* who ruled Memphis and the king of Lower
 Egypt (c. 1700 BCE, No. 27 of 13th Dynasty),
 at the same time of the king of Upper Egypt
Šnfr-ib-Rc - *S-n-wśrt* IV. (in the first half of 13th Dynasty,
 2nd Intermediate Period).

32- Unknown (... *n(j) mr(w)t* ?), he was considered
 as HPPM according to the necklace () on
 his Cairo Museum Statue, Temporary Number
 14/6/24/12*,¹⁰⁸ and carried many titles (such
 as: ‘Hereditary Nobleman,...’, etc.) on its kilt
 and base. Temp. of *Nbw-Rc* (2nd Intermediate
 Period).

III. New Kingdom

33- *Mntw*, son of god’s father, the high
 priest of Heliopolis, called *Hr-m3c-hrw* (reign
 of *Ipp* ‘Apophis’, Hyksos), son of cm-priest
 of Ptah called *Wr-htp* (reign of *Šrk* ‘Salitis’(?),
 Hyksos), son of god’s father called *Hr-s3-Ist*,
 son of god’s father called *Ir-mr*, son of god’s
 father called *K3-hp*, son of the priest, the lector-
 priest called *Hr-m-htp*, son of god’s father, *hrj-
 s3t3 n Pth* called *Pth-m-h3(t)*, son of cm-priest
 of Ptah called *P3-šr* (reign of *‘3-kn*, Hyksos),
 son of the HPPM called *Šr-gm* (reign of *Jbj*,

- 13th Dynasty). *Mntw* was mentioned on Berlin 23673: 3/4, Temp. of *Nb-ph.tj-R*^c (Ahmos I).
- 34- or *P3-jrd* (H. Ranke's¹⁰⁹ and G. Daresy's reading), or *P3-jmrd* (D.H. Ranke's and Wildung's reading),¹¹⁰ *P3-jm-rd* (L. Borchardt's reading),¹¹¹ or *P3j-imj-(h)rd* (Ch. Maystre's reading),¹¹² son of *hrj-sšt3 n Pth* called *Tj* and the grandson of the HPPM called *Mntw*. He was mentioned on Berlin 23673: 3/2, Temp. of *Dśr-k3-R*^c (Amenophis I).
- 35- *Sn-nfr* I,¹¹³ His daughter called *Šrj.t-R*^c was a wife of the purifying-priest of the goddess Sekhmet, the royal scribe, the overseer of the cattle, *Nb-nhtw*, son of the priest of *Hrj-š3f* called *Inn-ms*. *Sn-nfr* was mentioned and illustrated on the left-hand of the upper register of Cairo Museum rounded-top Stele JE. 46993* (=SR. 11688), and held the title of High priest of Heliopolis (i.e. *wr m3ww m Iwnw*) besides many other titles such as šm-priest, that was under the reigns of Thutmose III / Amenophis III. He would like also to be combined with his private monkey (stand beside his seat). Leiden Museum R 53 (?) Temp. Thutmose III.
- 36- *Pth-ms* I,¹¹⁴ Cairo Museum Naos CG. 70038* from Abydos (SR. 11593), Temp. *Mn-hpr-R*^c (Thutmose III.) *Nfr (.w)-hpr*.¹¹⁵
- 37- *Pth-ms* II, son of the vizier *Dhw.tj-ms*. He would also like to be combined with his private monkey, such as *Š3bw* II called *Jbbj*, as it appeared on his Cairo Museum Kneeling headless Statue CG. 584*1 from Memphite Necropolis (SR. 139333) beside his right leg, Leiden Museum Stele V 14 = Leiden Museum Stele 27 with lower part in University College Museum in London*. He had also many monuments from his tomb: Florence false door 2565*3, Berlin Pyramidion 2276*4, Berlin Stele 3427*5, Berlin Scarab 20661(?)*6, (BM 56863, BM 4640, BM 54989, BM 5472, BM Golden Ring 2939)*7, and others such as Leiden Museum 635. Temp. Thutmose IV.¹¹⁶
- 38- *Pth-ms* III, son of the priest *Mn-hpr*, Florence Museum Pyramidion 2537*1 and Florence Museum Squatting-Statue 1505 = 1790*2. Temp. Amenophis III.¹¹⁷
- 39- *Dhw.tj-ms*, son of King Amenophis III. He would like to be combined with his private cat *T3-mj.t* (Cairo Museum Cat-Coffin CG. 5003, JE. 30172, SR. 11711)*. Temp. Amenophis III.¹¹⁸
- 40- *Pth-ms* IV, son of the HPPM *Dhw.tj-ms* and grandson of King Amenophis III, only Louvre 3026¹¹⁹, although D. Wildung¹²⁰ referred to both Florence false door 2565* (Fig. 37.3) and Florence Museum Pyramidion 2537* (Fig. 38.1). Temp. Amenophis III.
- I must here refer to that D. Wildung mentioned *Pth-ms* V, son of the vizier *Dhw.tj* and that he practiced his duties under the reign of Amenophis III,¹²¹ but I did not agree with him because he is the same HPPM of no 37 (*Pth-ms* II).¹²²
- 41- *P3-hm-ntr* I, son of *Pth-ms* III, son of the priest *Mn-hpr*. About him, D. Wildung¹²³ referred to both Stockholm Museum 54 and Florence Museum Squatting-Statue 1505 = 1790* (Fig. 38.2). Temp. Amenophis III.¹²⁴
- 42- (?) (according to L. Borchardt's reading¹²⁵) or *Pn-p3-nbs* (?) (according to D. Wildung's reading¹²⁶). He was mentioned in Berlin 23673: 2/12, and according to it he was the son of the god's father and the keeper of Ptah's secrets, *Nhm-n-Pth*, son of the cm-priest of Ptah and the

high priest of Heliopolis *Nb-Rc* (who was contemporary to King Thutmose III). Temp. Amenophis III.¹²⁷

43- *Wr-mr* (according to D. Wildung's reading¹²⁸) or *Mr(j)-wr* (according to Ch. Maystre's reading¹²⁹), son of the HPPM *P-n-p3-nb.s*. He was mentioned in Berlin 23673: 2/11. Temp. Amenophis III.¹³⁰

44- *Pth-mrj* (according to D. Wildung's reading¹³¹) or *Mr(j)-Pth* (according to Ch. Maystre's reading¹³²), Louvre Statue A 60, Berlin Offering-table 2273* (from Saqqara), and Karlsruhe H 1046 (Inscriptions from his tomb at Saqqara). Temp. End of 18th Dynasty.¹³³

45- *Pth-m-h3.t*¹³⁴ called *Tj*; ¹³⁵ cf. (no. 45.a). BM Stele 972*1 (+ John Gardner Wilkinson MSS xviii 72; ix 140),¹³⁶ Louvre E 8420,¹³⁷ Amherst 213,¹³⁸ Berlin 13297, Berlin 12410-12412*2-3,¹³⁹ and Copenhagen-Ny Carlsberg E 92¹⁴⁰. His name was only mentioned *Tj* in Berlin 23673: 2/8.

He is the son of the god's father of Ptah *Hr(j)* (according to BM 972 + Wilkinson MSS xviii 72), or the son of the god's father of Amun-Re the lord of Karnak *Skr-m-s3.f*, the son of the god's father of Sekhmet and the priest of the king *It-ntr.j* (3y) called *Ipw*, the son of the HPPM no. 43 *Wr-mr*, the son of the HPPM no. 42 *P-n-p3-nb.s* (according to Berlin 23673).

From the above-mentioned monuments, we know, at least three of his sons: [1] 'The lector-priest and the god's father' in the temple of goddess Bastet *S3jj*, [2] the purifying-priest of Ptah *P3-hm-ntr*, and [3] the purifying-priest of Ptah *Pth-m-wj3*.¹⁴¹

Temp. Tut-anhk-amun (according to Ch. Maystre,¹⁴² A.R. Schulman,¹⁴³ and M. Rice¹⁴⁴), Ay (according to PM III2), or *Dsr-hpr-*

Rc stp-n-Rc hqr-em-heb (according to D. Wildung¹⁴⁵).

45.a- *nh.tj*,¹⁴⁶???, according to E. Schiaparelli.¹⁴⁷

I think it is an incorrect reading of the name inscribed on BM Stele 972 (see above no. 45).

46- *Hrj* I, Temp. End of 18th Dynasty,¹⁴⁸ grandfather or one of ancestors of the HPPM *P3-hm-ntr* II, who was the son of *Mh*.¹⁴⁹

47- *Skr-m-s3.f*.¹⁵⁰ He was mentioned on Berlin 23673: 2/7, and according to it he was the son of the HPPM *Pth-m-h3.t* called *Tj*, the son of the god's father of Amun-Re the lord of Karnak *Skr-m-s3.f*, who was called *Hr(j)* on BM 972 + Wilkinson MSS xviii 72). Temp. *Mn-m3c.t-Rc* (Seti I.).¹⁵¹

48- *Ntr.wj-htp*.¹⁵² He was mentioned on Berlin 23673: 2/6, and according to it he was the son of the HPPM *Skr-m-s3.f*, the son of the HPPM *Pth-m-h3.t* called *Tj*. Temp. Seti I.¹⁵³

49- *P3-hm-ntr* II,¹⁵⁴ son of *Mh* and *Nn3*: Florence Pillar 2607*;¹⁵⁵ BM Stele 183¹⁵⁶ (= London Tablet 796¹⁵⁷). He was the father of 'the overseer of the city and the vizier' (of Lower Egypt in Memphis) *Rc-htp* (BM lower part of seated Statue 712¹⁵⁸) or sometimes as *P3-Rc-htp*, and his grandson *Mrj.tj* was 'the chief overseer of cattle of Amun' (on BM Stele 183) or called *Mrj* and carried the title *idnw n pr-cnh* 'the deputy of the house of life' (on BM Statue 712). Temp. Seti I/ Ramesses II.¹⁵⁹

50- *Sn-nfr* II,¹⁶⁰ Leiden Canopic-jar R 53,¹⁶¹ and Bruxelles Museum Canopic-jar E. 5895,¹⁶² and mentioned also on *P3-hm-ntr* III's Cairo Museum Temp. Nr. 17/3/25/5*.¹⁶³ Temp. Seti I (?).

51- *P3-hm-ntr* III, son of *Sn-nfr* II (?),¹⁶⁴ Cairo Museum Temp. Nr. 17/3/25/5* (Fig. 50) (JE. 27322, SR. 14267).¹⁶⁵ Temp. 19th Dynasty.¹⁶⁶

- 52- *Hwj*,¹⁶⁷ Louvre Ushabti S 1207 dated Year 26 (?) (1254/1253 BCE) found in Serapeum among the burial Apis, died in Year 16 (1264/1263 BCE) under the reign of Ramesses II, the date D. Wildung referred to, but he became HPPM in Year 2 (1278/1277 BCE) under the reign of Ramesses II according to K.A. Kitchen.¹⁶⁸
- 53- IV,¹⁶⁹ Florence 1679 (column from his tomb),¹⁷⁰ Cairo Museum CG. 1087,¹⁷¹ Berlin 33,¹⁷² and BM Stele 18.¹⁷³ Temp. 19th Dynasty (according to D. Wildung)¹⁷⁴ or Ramesses II (?) (according to Ch. Maystre),¹⁷⁵ and confirmed by K. Kitchen in Years 19/20 (1261/1260 – 1260/1259 BCE) under the reign of Ramesses II.¹⁷⁶
- 54- VI.,¹⁷⁷ Louvre Stele 3062.¹⁷⁸ He held several administrative, military (wall from his tomb in Leiden Museum*), religious and priestly titles. His father was a god's father, his mother named *Mwt-nfr.t*, his wife named *T3-mj.t*; he had eleven children (six sons: four of them were priests, and five daughters).¹⁷⁹ Temp. Ramesses II.
- 55- *Ddj3* (Dedia),¹⁸⁰ from Asiatic origin, back to the head of the family 'the judge, the overseer of the scribes of the buildings of Amun' *P3-dj-B3r*¹⁸¹ 'Pethw-Baal' (Louvre Stele C 50),¹⁸² BM Stela 183 <796>,¹⁸³ BM Stela 738,¹⁸⁴ Cairo Statue CG. 42122,¹⁸⁵ Turin Ushabti 2666 (Fig. 66).¹⁸⁶ His priesthood might have been during the same time of his ancestor *P3-hm-ntr* II.
- From Louvre Stele C 50 and other resources, we know that *Ddj3* was born to 'the overseer of the scribes of the buildings of Amun' (*H3.t.i3j* (not *P3-hm-ntr* as Kitchen said)¹⁸⁷ from his wife , and had three brothers twice, and who held the title 'the scribe of buildings'. *Ddj3*, who married¹⁸⁸ and was the grandfather of the HPPM *Nb-mh.jt*,* held the same title of his father in addition to the title 'Chief of Draughtsmen-Painters in Karnak', served the Vizier Paser, who was in charge of directing the construction and decoration of buildings commissioned by King Seti I.¹⁸⁹
- He became HPPM under the reign of King Seti I (according to D. Wildung¹⁹⁰), or starting from Year 35 (1245/1244 BCE) under the reign of Ramesses II (according to K.A. Kitchen).¹⁹¹ H. Kees suggested that *Ddj3* might have been the father-in-law(?) of the vizier and the HPPM *R3-htp*,¹⁹² whose father(?) was the HPPM *P3-hm-ntr* (II) of BM Stela¹⁸³. Although Kitchen stated that *Ddj3* was the father of <*P3*>-*R3-htp*.¹⁹³
- 56- I,¹⁹⁴ BM Statue 947, Wien Statue 21 (No 5768), Block in Cambridge Fitzwilliam Museum, Cairo Museum Column JE. 41525 (Temp. Nr. 17/11/24/4), BM Deposits 49235 & 48664*. He was the Royal Prince (Year 50), the fourth son of King Ramesses II, and the second of the queen *I3.t-nfr.t*. He was only a cm-priest, and did not hold the title of HPPM, i.e. 'the Greatest director of craftsmen', since Year 16 (1264/1263 BCE) – 52 (c. 1228 BCE) under the reign of Ramesses II, but in K.A. Kitchen's opinion he became an HPPM in Years 45/46 (1235/1234 BCE) till Year 52 (c. 1228 BCE) during his father's reign.¹⁹⁵
- 57- *B3k-n-Hwnsw*. He held his post since the Year 46 (1234/1233 BCE) under the reign of Ramesses II (according to K.A. Kitchen).¹⁹⁶
- 58- BM lower part of seated Statue 712,¹⁹⁸ BM Stele 183,¹⁹⁹ (= London

Tablet 796), Cairo Museum Stele JE. 48845* (Temp. Nr. 14/4/24/4, SR. 13494),²⁰⁰ Cairo Museum Stele (no Nr.).²⁰¹

Rc-htp's father-in-law was ‘the first priest of *In-hr* (Onuris)’ *Mjnw-ms* and his mother-in-law, ‘the chief of the harem of Onuris’, *Bwj*, named *Ht-njswt* was sister of the Upper Egyptian vizier, also named *Rc-htp*. His wife, *Hnrj* was ‘the chief of the harem of *Hrj-s3.f* (Arsaphes)’, and his son *Mrj.tj* was ‘the chief overseer of cattle of Amun’ (BM Stele 183) or named *Mrj* and held the title ‘the deputy of the house of life’ (BM Statue 712). He became the Lower Egyptian vizier since Year 50 (1230/1229 BCE) under the reign of Ramesses II (according to K.A. Kitchen).²⁰²

Temp. He became an HPPM since Year 52 (c. 1228 BCE) under the reign of Ramesses II (according to D. Wildung); while since Year 55 (1225/1224 BCE) under the same reign (according to K.A. Kitchen).²⁰³

59- *Mrj-n-Pth*,²⁰⁴ the thirteenth son of King Ramesses II, from queen *Is.t-nfr.t*. Temp. Ramesses II, Year 55 (1225/1224 BCE) according to W.M. Fl. Petrie²⁰⁵ who stated that *Mrj-n-Pth* carried in this year the titles ‘the High Priest of Ptah, the Head of the Two Lands, the royal scribe, the chief overseer of the army’, beside the titles ‘son of the king, cm-priest, from his body, his beloved’ mentioned by Lepsius.²⁰⁶

60- [...] *nš-nh.t* (?)²⁰⁷ (according to D. Wildung) or [...] *nšn.t* (?) (according to L. Borchardt), He was mentioned also on Berlin 23673: 2/4, and was a son of the god’s father of Amun of Karnak, the engineer of the buildings of Ramesses II, *Pth-htp*, son of HPPM *Ntr.wj-htp*, son of HPPM *Skr-m-s3.f*. Temp. Ramesses II.

61- *Pth-m-3h.t* I,²⁰⁸ Borchardt read his name *Pth-m-ihw.t* I. He was also mentioned on Berlin 23673: 2/3. Temp. Ramesses II.

62- *H3j*, who was former vizier of Upper Egypt in Thebes. Ramesses II honored him with the Memphite priestly office till his death (*H3j*’s death).²⁰⁹

63- *Nfr-rnp.t*,²¹⁰ son of HPPM *Pth-m-3h.t* I, son of [...] *nš-nh.t* (?). Leiden Statue with naos D 44, BM Libation Tank (offering table?) 108*, Berlin 2290, Cairo Museum Block-Statue CG. 713 and Statue-naos CG. 1034, Liverpool Pyramidion M 11015, Amherst Collection Stele, BM Stele 4104. He was also mentioned on Berlin 23673: 2/2.

He was a vizier and held his priestly office since the Years 60/61 (1220/1219 – 1219/1218 BCE) under the reign of Ramesses II (according to K.A. Kitchen),²¹¹ Ramesses II / Merenptah (according to D. Wildung).




He held the title (*i)m(j)-r(3) hmw-ntr n ntrw nbw (nw) Šm'w Mhw ‘the overseer of the priests of all deities of Upper Egypt and Lower Egypt’, which was carried by his successor *Šd-sw-Nfrtm* (under the reign of *Ššn.k* I, 22nd Dynasty), and was similar to the title (*i* *m(j)-r(3) hmw-ntr n/m Šm'w Mhw ‘the overseer of the priests of Upper and Lower Egypt’*, held before by both successors *Pth-ms* II and *Dhw.tj-ms*.²¹²*

64- *Pth-m-3h.t* II,²¹³ son of *Nfr-rnp.t*, son of *Pth-m-3h.t* I.. He was also mentioned on Berlin 23673: 2/1. Temp. 19th Dynasty (according to D. Wildung), unfortunately the king’s name is destroyed.

65- *Hrj* II, son of the royal prince and the cm-priest *H(j)-m-W3s.t*, and the grandson of King Ramesses II. He held his office since

Years 65/66 (1215/1214 – 1214/1213 BCE) under the reign of Ramesses II (according to K.A. Kitchen).²¹⁴

He also had a son named *Hrj* carried titles: ‘Prince and Mayor, God’s father, Beloved of the God, Master of Secrets of Ptah’s Temple, Mayor of the City (Memphis),’ and was a ‘vizier’ of Seti II.²¹⁵ (Fragments of the base of sandstone Statue found in Kom El-Arbaeen كوم الأربعين at Memphis;²¹⁶ Cairo Museum CG. 1174²¹⁷ and Brooklyn Museum 37.1920 E*a-b²¹⁸). Temp. 19th Dynasty, late Ramesses II/Merenptah.

- 66-  *Nb-mḥj.t*,²¹⁹ the grandson of HPPM *Ddj*,²²⁰ Turin (R. Museo di Antichità e Turijn) Funeral Statue 2666*.²²¹ Temp. 19th Dynasty (according to H. Kees²²²).
- 67-  or  *Ḥ(j)-m-W3s.t* II., Temp. 19th Dynasty,²²³ the vizier and the HPPM (Aix-en-Provence 15²²⁴), son of the mayor of the city and the vizier *Hrj*,²²⁵ and the grandfather of ‘w^cb-priest and lector-priest of Ptah’ *Wr-hrp-hmw(.wt)* (BM kneeling Statue holding naos with statue of Ptah 845²²⁶), Cairo Stele-Collection of Michaelidès,²²⁷ Cairo Column JE. 43271,²²⁸ and an inscription in Wien Museum.²²⁹
- 68-  *Hrj* III,²³⁰ son of the vizier and the HPPM *Ḥ(j)-m-W3s.t* (Aix-en-Provence 15²³¹), son of the mayor of the city and the vizier *Hrj*.²³² BM Statue 845,²³³ Cairo Stele-Collection of Michaelidès,²³⁴ Berlin Sarcophagus 57,²³⁵ BM Stele 167,²³⁶ Cairo Column JE. 43271.²³⁷
- He carried on BM 845 the titles: ‘Hereditary nobleman, Count, God’s father, beloved from the god, cm-priest, the Greatest of the directors of craftsmen’, and was the ‘son of the Greatest
- of the directors of craftsmen, *Ḥ(j)-m-W3s.t*; while his son, *Wr-hrp(.w)-hmw(.wt)*, was only ‘w^cb-priest and lector-priest of Ptah’.
- From Cairo Stele-Collection of Michaelidès, we know that he married a ‘singer of Hathor lady of the southern sycamore’, named *St-k3*, and have three daughters (*T3-imt*, *Mr.jt-Pth*, *T3-bš*), and a son called *Km* was a ‘priest of Baal’. That was without any mention to the son *Wr-hrp-hmw(.wt)* of BM 845.
- Temp. end of 19th and 20th Dynasties (according to Wildung),²³⁸ or from Year 24 (1161 BCE) of the reign of Ramesses III. (according to Pierre Grandet).²³⁹
- 69-  *Jjrj*,²⁴⁰ Louvre Statue A 71.²⁴¹ Temp. Seti II in the 19th Dynasty (according to D. Wildung). He had a son carried the titles ‘the god’s father of Ptah, the sm-priest’. Some elements* of his tomb (at Saqqara) reused again to cover the ceiling of tomb (W) in Kom el-Fakhry (Mit-Rahina).
- 70-  *P3-hm-ntr* V,²⁴² Louvre Double-Statue A 72*, he appeared on it with the vizier *Hrj*.²⁴³ Temp. 19th and 20th Dynasties (according to D. Wildung).²⁴⁴
- 71-  or  *Ḥ(j)-m-W3s.t* III, (QV 44), son of Ramesses III. He was only a cm-priest of Ptah at Memphis (= deputy to the High Priest), but had never carried the title HPPM. His priesthood took time in both²⁴⁵ the reigns of his father (Ramesses III, 1185-1153 BCE)²⁴⁶ and his brother (Ramesses IV, 1153-1146 BCE).²⁴⁷
- 72-  *Hrj* IV,²⁴⁸ son of the ‘Mayor (of Memphis)’ *Pth-mš*, Cairo Museum Column Temp. Nr. 20/1/25/4 (SR. 14125)*1,²⁴⁹ and wall painting in Serapeum of Saqqara are published by Mohamed Ibrahim Aly in his

PhD thesis*2-3.²⁵⁰ He carried, as his father, the title ‘Mayor (of Memphis)’ beside his other titles *irj-p^c.t, it-ntr mrj ntr, w^b c.wj, sm*, etc.



Temp. End of 18th Dynasty (according to Wildung²⁵¹) or end of 19th Dynasty and early 20th Dynasty (according to M.I. Aly and PM III who connected him probably with the Ramesside period), and I agree with the last opinion for several reasons.²⁵²


73-  H^c(j)-m-W3s.t IV, Temp. 20th Dynasty,²⁵³ Philadelphia-University Museum Faience Stele E. 13578: held on it the titles ‘Governer of the Town and Vizier, Greatest of the Directors of craftsmen’, etc.²⁵⁴

He was an HPPM under the reign of Ramesses IX²⁵⁵ H^c(j)-m-W3s.t (1123-1104),²⁵⁶ and according to two papyri dating to Years 16 and 17 of the reign of Ramesses IX, he was a vizier of Upper Egypt.²⁵⁷


74-  N3n3,²⁵⁸ who was also known as Pth-m^s(jw) VII,²⁵⁹ Berlin Scarab 20661*.²⁶⁰ He also carried the titles  s3.f mr.f hrd n k3p Pth-m^s dd n f N3n3 ‘his son, his beloved, the child of the K3p,²⁶¹ Pth-m^s, who called N3n3’ in TT. 193 (Sheikh Abdel Qurnah) of P3-irj.²⁶² Temp. Late of New Kingdom (according to D. Wildung).

75-  B3k-n-Jmn, Temp. New Kingdom.²⁶³











(Fig. B.) Part of *Saqqara List* (Cairo Museum, CG. 34516 A = JE. 11335 = SR. 11967).




(Fig. C.) Genealogy Tree of HPPM on Berlin 23676.

Dated to the reign of the king *Ssnk I.* (22nd Dynasty)











72.1 *Hrj IV.* (son of *Pth-ms*, the Mayor of Memphis)
